
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From the Chairman

Knaphill firm helping the hearing-impaired

A specialised Knaphill company providing products to assist people with hearing impairments has been granted a £125,000 Enterprise M3 expansion loan which it hopes will help increase its product range.

Conversor, located in Lower Guildford Road, designs and manufactures assistive listening devices (ALDS), which work by using a microphone that can be directed towards or placed near the desired sound source. This is then transmitted to a receiver worn by the user, thereby amplifying the sound and reducing background noise and improving the hearing experience for the hearing-aid wearer.

Houses Houses!

Woking Borough Council has an adopted Local Development Plan which commits the Council to the building of 292 new homes a year. This is a major challenge not only to build the houses but to provide the services that will be required to meet the demands of new residents. So what has been the impact on Knaphill?

From our monitoring of all things planning we have recorded 334 new homes in Knaphill that have either been built or have received planning approval since the new Local Development Plan was adopted. There are a further 19 new homes in the planning process.

Given the location of Knaphill of interest to residents is what is happening in neighbouring Surrey Heath. A favourite development area is the A322 corridor. The A322, better known to locals as the Bagshot Road connects M4, M3 and A3 with Guildford and by any definition should be considered a major highway. Returning to new homes, if you take the A322 corridor from Brookwood Crossroads to Gordon Boys School roundabout in West End we have recorded over 650 new homes either being built or in the planning process. During the debate on Brookwood Farm all those involved agreed that the A322 is congested and Brookwood Farm development is less than 50% of total build being considered. Also on top of new homes we have a 62 bed care home being built on the site of the old Fox Inn, Bisley.

I am sure that politicians at every level are pleased with the number of new homes that are being planned but where they fail, and fail miserably, is the provision of infrastructure that is required to meet the demands of such a large influx of new residents. By infrastructure I mean easy access to a local GP, NHS dentist, places in local schools and improved road network. The Government, when they launched their New Planning Policy Framework, promised that the infrastructure would be improved as new homes were being built. This promise does not seem to be on the agenda of either Woking Borough Council or Surrey Heath Council and local Councillors do not want to talk about it.

As we approach an election and you get local politicians on your doorstep ask them what they are doing about

Following a protracted planning appeal the Planning Inspector had good news for the residents of both Highclere Road and Lane End Drive as the Inspector dismissed the appeal to build either 3 or 4 new houses on the site of the bungalow.

Brookwood Farm

A number of the new houses that are part of Phase 1 of the development on Brookwood Farm are now occupied and the KRA welcomes the new residents to Knaphill. Work on the new estate is progressing in two parts. Enter the estate from Redding Way and you have the show houses and the first group of houses to be occupied. Walk down Sparvell Road and take the footpath towards Sheet's Heath and you will see the second phase which includes the affordable houses being built.

Vyne Bollards Debate

This issue has not been forgotten, and will be pursued in the near future in the wider context of other local traffic

Knaphill Residents Association AGM

This year's Annual General Meeting will be held on Wednesday 22nd April in the hall of the Methodist Church on The Broadway.

The evening will open at 7.30pm with an illustrated talk by Robyn Higgs from The Basingstoke Canal Society on the history of the canal and its use today.

The official business of the AGM will commence at 8.30pm, and will offer an opportunity to meet the Residents Association Committee and hear about the activities of the last twelve months. Woking MP Jonathan Lord, our local Councillors, and representatives of Woking Borough Council and Surrey Police will also be attending and ready to address your concerns and offer advice as necessary.

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Work in Sussex Road playground and carpark.

Work has been carried out by WBC in and round the play area in Sussex Road Recreation Park. Over the past couple of winters the playground has been seriously flooded making it unusable for weeks at a time. A trench has been dug and a soakaway installed which will hopefully avoid such problems in the future. In addition, a new barrier has been erected on the land by the side of the playground with two removable posts to allow additional parking on the old tennis court and basketball area, to alleviate parking problems associated with school opening and closing times and when special events take place at the Bowls Club.

The Residents Association has also requested WBC to investigate the possibility of clearing the surface of the tennis court and basketball area and repainting the lines. There are no sports facilities for older children at this end of the village, and this would mean that at weekends and school-holiday times youngsters can put this area to good use.

Towards a (slightly) greener Knaphill

A new tree, a Pyrus Chanticleer or ornamental pear, has been planted outside the new Karcher shop, replacing the ugly stump that had been an eyesore for too long. Our thanks go to Kate Wilson, our WBC Neighbourhood Officer for her help in organising this, and to Serco for carrying out the work.



Well, although we are still impatiently awaiting spring, nothing says we can't look a season further on and turn our thoughts to the summer 2015 Village Show, which indeed the RA committee are already actively doing, as all that fun doesn't just happen by itself!



So, turn your diaries and calendars to Saturday 18th July, and make sure you keep the day free to be at Mizens Farm at 1pm.

As usual, there will be plenty of activities and entertainment for young and old, based around this year's theme of an Olde English Country Fair. Details of the day's full programme will be published on our website and in our June edition.

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Library reduced hours of opening?



Support Knaphill library!

The Friends Group at Knaphill Library has learnt that there is a review taking place of the opening hours of the smaller libraries, including Knaphill, looking at reducing opening times by 15%.

Knaphill Library moved to its current building eight years ago when it extended its opening hours to what they are today. The library is an excellent facility which is well used and appreciated, not only by Knaphillians, but also people from areas around Knaphill who prefer it to travelling into Woking for the library. It is in fact the busiest library of its size in Surrey.

It has many excellent facilities and activities including a very popular Rhyme Time for toddlers which would be directly affected by a reduction in hours. It also supports two Reading Groups, activities for children during the summer holidays, author visits, and has excellent free internet and wi-fi provision.

As a Friends Group we are keen to see the library continue to prosper by maintaining its opening hours and current usage. We have had promises from our MP Jonathan Lord and County Councillor Saj Hussain that they will support our endeavour to retain Knaphill Library's opening times and activities as at present, but please contact them yourselves to underline our efforts and prove that there is very real grass-roots support for our campaign.

MIZENS RAILWAY

The Mizens Miniature Railway in Barr's Lane re-opens on Easter Sunday for the start of our 2015 Running Season, and many special events are planned for the coming year.

An enthusiastic team of volunteers has spent the winter carrying out routine maintenance and developments to the site. There have been many improvements including extensive changes to the track in front of the signal box to facilitate access to the high-level line. The new running line over this route is to be known as 'The Highlander'.

As well as opening up new routes, the new track layout will provide additional interest for those wanting to watch trains go by. An extra platform has been added to the main station for passengers to disembark from The Highlander and leave via the footbridge. A new lever frame for the North Signal Box has been installed and additional signals are nearing completion for the new high-level route although there is still quite a lot of electrical work to do to connect all of the points and signals to the signal box. Several trains ran over the Highlander Route towards the end of last season to test the new track and signalling, and as soon as these

are fully commissioned the route will be put into regular use. The popular 'Suburban' and 'Miler' routes will continue in use as before.

The railway is generally open to the public on Sunday afternoons from the beginning of May until the end of September, plus Easter Sunday and Thursday afternoons in August. For full details of running days, please see the Mizens website

Knaphill Woodcraft Folk has been running groups in the


area for about 45 years.


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



Knaphill Methodist Church



When Methodists arrived in Knaphill in the middle of the 19thC, it was a small village consisting of a few houses and farms, a forge, a couple of inns. the Anchor Hotel and a farmhouse which served as the post Open-air office. Methodist services were first held on Anchor Hill from 1865, partly in an attempt to dissuade people from playing cricket on the local green on Sunday!

Wesleyan ministers then formed a Sunday School which meet first in a barn and then in what is still the Royal Oak public house.

As Membership of the Methodist Society grew, a chapel was opened at the top of the hill in 1867 on land purchased from the London Necropolis Co., and a hall was added 10 years later for the Sunday School. Lord Shaftesbury himself was said to have preached in the chapel.

By the early 20th century, the chapel was a feature of the village, not only providing a religious focus but also serving the community and providing "wholesome" social activities such as the Coronation Cycling Club. The Sunday School grew rapidly, and in 1908 the annual outing used a newfangled charabanc to transport the children to their picnic in Ottershaw Park.

During WW1, the Sunday School Hall was opened to local soldiers so that they could write letters home in some comfort and enjoy light refreshments. After the war, new links were created with the community: the chapel became the venue of Surrey County Council's Infant Welfare Centre, and two years later to meet the needs of the young people in the church and the village, the Knaphill Sunshine League was set up providing a wide programme

the of social gatherings, sporting activities, talks and outings, with devotions included in the meetings.

Over time it became necessary to improve and renovate the Chapel, and work was completed in 1917, but in 1935 it was found to be beyond repair, and a fully rebuilt new church opened in November that year. It included a completely equipped church pipe organ specially designed to fit the building, the smallest the manufacturers had ever

During WW2, activities had to be curtailed due to the blackout; many children were evacuated from London to Knaphill and the church hall was used as a day school. Post WW2, many Woking area churches came together to reach the population with the Gospel and a particular effort was made for "young people in their teen ages" by creating many activities and groups. There was a strong church choir led by the choirmaster Walter Deakin, which became the basis of Woking's famous Epworth Choir. The annual Harvest celebrations included huge themed displays of harvest products much of which was provided by Brookwood Hospital farm. During the 60s and 70s, youth activities were numerous and varied - sports, artistic and practical - and the regular pantomimes and musicals continued the musical tradition.

In 1968-70 major work was carried out to the rear of the premises to update sanitary and catering facilities as well as create a new store room which was eventually divided into two to become the crèche and Youth Club. A little later, the old organ was replaced with a modern electric organ and a new boiler was installed, better access and increased storage facilities were created. In the late 1990s it was decided that further extensive work was required to improve access to the various parts of the building, including a central welcome area and upgrade of catering facilities, and this took place between May and November

Work with young people continues to be a strong part of the ministry with many groups and activities taking place, as well as community activities such as a choir and play

Future plans are now being devised. The church has engaged an architect who will consult church members and community representatives before drawing up some options about how the congregation may continue to use the site on Broadway to serve Knaphill and the surrounding areas with the love of God in the coming generations.

KNAPHILL FC



With just over a couple of months to go in the current 2014/15 season, Knaphill's first season in the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League has brought a mixed results over the last few months at this higher level of football. But the Club's aim in the League is to finish around the mid-table position by the end of their

programme of 40 League games.

A few of the fixtures since December were hit by the weather - defeated by the rain! - so rearranged matches have therefore been on the agenda just recently. Resultswise, the past month has seen three narrow 2-1 defeats in away fixtures, but one of the best results recently came with a 3-0 win over Spelthorne Sports; the two new signings in the team made a big impact on the game which produced a good all- round team performance.

The Club saw a Management change in January this year when first team manager Phil Ruggles left the club; Knaphill now have Keith Hills as caretaker manager for the rest of the season. Having had a good 'mini run' in FA Cup and FA Vase earlier in the season, it's now into the latter stages of the season; the club had twelve

games remaining in their League programme as they went into the last week of February, and are looking at a points target they hope will stabilise a favourable finishing position in the Premier.

Off the pitch, Knaphill are planning to have an additional seated stand and a second standing covered stand to complement their current 50-seater stand and covered standing at Redding Way, making further progress with the additional facilities required at Premier Division level for next season. Although a tight timeframe, it's hoped the extra stands will be in place by 31st March.
