The latest (and sadly the last) from our Knaphill Residents' Association Planning Expert, Phil Stubbs

This will be my last piece for the magazine as I step down from the KRA Committee. I am now in my 70's and felt that it was time for a younger generation to try and steer the Council in a way that benefits the residents of Knaphill. My family moved into Knaphill in 1984, Brookwood hospital was still a functioning hospital, in fact we bought our house from a retired nurse from the hospital and our neighbour was still working at the hospital as a secretary. The centre of Knaphill was very busy with a wide choice of shops and services. Those days have gone and where the hospital stood we have over 1,000

houses/apartments and the local shops operate under the shadow of Sainsbury's. They call it progress.

The local press has carried a lot of objections to proposed green villages especially the proposed development of Fairoaks but very little attention is given to the development along the A322 Bagshot road/Guildford Road. With the development that took place on the hospital site, Brookwood Farm and ongoing development in Bisley and West End there will be close to 2,000 new dwellings built or given planning permission since I moved

into Knaphill but the infrastructure has changed very

little. We were recently presented with several proposed changes to the junctions on the Bagshot Road and we await a decision from Woking Borough Council. There is some good news, the owners of the Knaphill surgery have submitted a planning application to extend the surgery in Redding Way, a much-needed extension but more could be done to improve the quality of life for residents but that is for the younger generation to formulate.



KNAPHILL VILLAGE SHOW 2017


Sue Stocker reflects on our popular village show

KNAPHILL COMMUNITY FACEBOOK PAGE

Knaphill has a new Facebook page that is proving to be very popular with the local community and with former Knaphillians who have moved away but still retain an interest in the 'goings on' in Knaphill Village.

Set up under a year ago the Knaphill Community Facebook Page, with over 1000 LIKES, has become increasingly popular. Around 5,000 people a week engage with posts about local events and news. A typical post reach for the site is 13,000 people and the page already has over 1,000 followers and the various postings that appear on a regular basis attract considerable interest and response.

The page is run by volunteers from the Knaphill Residents' Association with the aim of sharing information, helping local businesses, allowing communication between residents, and informing people

of important issues affecting the local area. For example, the proposed changes to the A322, new planning applications, and any retail developments. The page seeks to keep its readers informed about what is happening in Knaphill in particular – events big and small – and provides a 'sounding board' for residents to express their opinions about various local issues, as well as a place to post queries and find answers. It is deliberately geared up, wherever possible, to sound a positive note and encourage the regeneration of our village.

Although the page is not constantly manned, the volunteers who oversee it still manage a response rate of around 4 minutes! After 20 months of fundraising, which included lots of cake sales, raffles, quizzes and the money gained from our Chip Shop Challenge badge, 3rd Knaphill Guides went on our very first international trip to Switzerland in August. The reason we chose

to go to Switzerland wasn't just because we wanted to but also because there is a World Guiding Centre there called 'Our Chalet' (which got confusing when talking about the chalet we stayed in) so that was an obvious reason to go there.

When we got there, we visited Our Chalet which just so happened to be the first World Guiding Center and was also celebrating its 85th birthday so that was exciting. We stayed in a village called Adelboden which was high in the mountains which had snow on the top. The view was amazing and our leader Helen got way too excited when she spotted the first mountain.

We had a packed week full of activities, which included a visit to a chocolate show in Interlaken, zip wiring over a river, tobogganing at the top of a mountain, a visit to a woodcarver (such a long walk in the baking sun), a typical Swiss fondue and we also visited waterfalls and caves.

Half way through the week, the Guide and



Scout groups staying in Adelboden travelled by cable car to the top of a mountain for a Swiss evening with lots Swiss food and music played on an alpine horn and accordions with more entertainment by the other Guide and Scout groups. We saw the sun set over the mountains and could hear the cowbells echoing through the valley.

Our last activity for the week involved travelling by cable car high up to the very top of a mountain to watch traditional mountain cheese being made from scratch, which we then got to taste.

We had such an amazing time that we are already busy planning our next international trip, this time to Croatia in two years' time. We'd also like to say a huge thank you to everyone who helped us raise money.



THE SECRET KNAPHILLIAN: Pub Crawl

Our intrepid Secret Investigator shops anonymously in Knaphill

As summer draws to a close, I thought I would savour the last rays of sunshine, and take on the challenge of

testing the pubs in Knaphill... a hard task but someone has to do it! I wanted to test out the 5 pubs across Knaphill for both child and adult appeal and what better way than to put their food, drinks and facilities to the test with a pub crawl of sorts with my four-year-old son!

So, with the little man on his bike and me on foot we made our way to the furthest pub from home: **The Royal Oak** – A 17th century pub with a garden, this beautiful little pub won Woking in Bloom, something the pint serving gardener was rightly proud of. The garden has a small children's play area, lots of outdoor seating and very welcoming staff. The menu is full of tasty homemade dishes with the specialty being curry (of which there were 5 choices). Both the toilets and garden are being refurbished, so this is definitely one for next summer. A GREAT start!

Plodding up the hill (pushing a four-year-old on his bike), we made our way to the next watering hole: **The Anchor** – You can't miss

this yellow pub in the centre of Knaphill, which serves as a good pub for a pit-stop. Not much of a garden, or things to occupy the kids so we had some crisps, a drink and a stroke of the local dog and moved on to the next one ...

The Crown – A 19th Century pub sitting on the main high street of the village. It has been beautifully refurbished and offers a variety of seating areas both inside and outside in its beer garden which is a real sun trap. Chalk boards advertise curry nights and live music, which would be well worth a visit when a babysitter is next booked! We peddled on to:

The Garibaldi – at the crossroads as you are leaving Knaphill. Another one for the gardeners with plenty of hanging baskets, and a good history to boot. The menu looks tasty and there is something on most evenings from curry nights, steak nights and roasts on Sundays. There is even an Oktoberfest week of celebrations from the end of September. On the home stretch now, we end our mini pub crawl at:

The Nags Head – Just around the corner from Sainsbury, this large pub with an

even larger garden is a favourite with many, offering seasonal food and drinks menus, great children's options and a cosy log fire in the winter.

The boy was starting to get the hang of things, and really enjoyed ordering at the bars, and it was refreshing to have all bar staff welcome him so warmly ... what a friendly bunch of publicans we have right here in Knaphill ... and I have to say a pub to suit every resident so take your pick, you won't be disappointed.

GIVING BACK TO THE COMMUNITY



Fruit of the Vyne

In an interview with the Editor, Gillian Waine, Operations Manager at the popular Vyne Centre for the Community, shares some of the secrets of its success

Located at the heart of our village on Broadway, just off Redding Way, the Vyne is a purpose-built community centre in Knaphill that offers something for everyone. Open daily for groups, and people of all ages to use, the facilities it provides are extensive and vital not just for our community, but the wider Woking borough as well.

Built in the mid-1990s on the site of the former North Lodge, which belonged to the old Brookwood Hospital, the Vyne is open daily for groups and people of all ages to use. Open to the public Monday to Friday, 9am to 4.30pm, the Vyne has an excellent suite of rooms, and offers a coffee bar, lunchtime meals, alongside a full activity and events programme, as well as excellent 'wellbeing' services such as assisted bathing, basic footcare, podiatry, hairdressing, reflexology and a range of support groups. In addition, the Vyne is open evenings and weekends for specific activities and private hire.

Regular weekly or monthly activities are

many and varied and include Dance, Fitness, Exercise Classes, Choral Singing, Art Classes, Yoga, Pilates, Short Mat Bowls, Computer Classes, a Knitting Group, Craft Sessions, Line Dancing, a Tea Dance, a Writers' Circle, Prayer and Share, and of course Bingo. There is a themed 'big lunch' once a month which includes a two-course meal with wine and entertainment, and there are organised monthly coach trips, and an annual holiday. The Citizens Advice Bureau are also present each week, and the Alzheimer's Society has a weekly 'drop in' where people can get advice or simply 'chat' about things.

The raison d'être behind the Vyne is to provide a service for members of the community rather than make money. The Centre is run by a staff of six - three fulltime and three part-time - and Woking Borough Council pay for the up-keep of the Centre and the salaries of the staff. The staff are assisted by various volunteers who help to make sure everything runs smoothly and efficiently. Clientele are mainly from the immediate locality but any borough can make use of the premises. Membership costs only £10 per annum (half-price if a member is on pension credit). Current users are mainly in the 65+ age range although



there is no age limit and the Vyne readily welcomes younger clients wanting to make use of the facilities. For instance, the advent of a weekly Parents/Carers and Toddlers Group would be great.

Amongst the needs of the Vyne Centre are more volunteers – active early retired people and younger people with time on their hands who could have something to offer. Volunteers would need to be DBS checked, but Woking Borough Council would pay for this.

Knaphill Clothing & Linen Bank

One bank closes ... and another kind of bank opens! Knaphill Methodist Church is setting up a "foodbank for clothes" to help people in Knaphill who could not otherwise afford clothing and bedding. The clothes bank,



which will operate like a foodbank, is being organised by members of Knaphill Methodist Church and follows the success of a similar project in Weybridge. The organisers aim to partner with Sure Start centres and other institutions, who will refer people in need to the clothes bank. Clients will then be able to pick out the clothes they need, and have a cup of tea and some food.

The Rev David Faulkner, Minister of Knaphill Methodist Church, thinks there will be high demand for a clothes bank, even in wealthy Surrey. "We've been aware that we ought to be offering something that meets a need in the community, and this seems to be one of the more unspoken needs," he said. "When they set up the clothes bank in Weybridge, they discovered this huge hidden need, and if it's in Weybridge it's probably here as well. Until you start, you don't always know, but the Weybridge people have been surprised by how much demand there has been. So, we'll set it up and see if we are scratching where people itch."

Jane Ing, a member of Knaphill Methodist Church, and one of the creators of the clothes bank, agrees that there is a high demand for this sort of service: "There is an immediate and urgent need for jeans, trainers and sleeping bags. As winter approaches, the need for jumpers and waterproof coats will increase. There's a centre in Brookwood that covers Brookwood and Pirbright. They have 834 families registered as underprivileged, so we've approached them about working with us.
